



POPE & MARTYR

When Martin I became pope in 649, the western half of the Roman empire had long since collapsed. Rome had lost its influence in the world. Constantinople was the new capital of the Empire, now known as the Byzantine Empire. Close in vicinity to the emperor, the patriarch of Constantinople played a greater role in world politics.

When Martin assumed the office of the pope, he did not have the consent of the emperor. He also held the Lateran of 649, condemning popular documents, including those by the Patriarch of Constantinople and the emperor, that claimed Christ did not have a human will.

The emperor sent troops to Rome to seize Martin and bring him back to Constantinople. Already in poor health, Martin offered no re-

sistance. Unfortunately, in his subsequent imprisonments, he was tortured and given many such hardships. Although condemned eventually to death, Martin was spared from execution by the pleas of a repentant Paul, patriarch of Constantinople, who was himself gravely ill. The cruel treatments had already taken their toll and Martin died shortly thereafter. He is the last of the early popes to be venerated as a martyr.

The breviary of the Byzantine Churches states: "Glorious definer of the Orthodox Faith ... sacred chief of divine dogmas, unstained by error ... true reprover of heresy ... foundation of bishops, pillar of the Orthodox faith, teacher of religion. ... Thou didst adorn the divine see of Peter, and since from this divine Rock, thou didst immovably defend the Church, so now thou art glorified with him."

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY



Holy Hour with confessions at 3 pm Divine Mercy Sunday, April 7.


In her *Diary*, St. Faustina records a special promise given to her by Jesus:

My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy (699).

During Jesus' revelations to St. Faustina, He asked that a feast day be dedicated to Divine Mercy. This feast should be celebrated on the 2nd Sunday of Easter. The liturgical texts of that day concern the institution of the Sacrament of Penance, and are thus already suited to Jesus' request. This Feast was granted to the Universal Church by Pope John Paul II on the occasion of the canonization of Sr. Faustina on April 30, 2000. In a decree, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments stated that "throughout the world the Second Sunday of Easter will receive the name Divine Mercy Sunday, a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind will experience in the years to come."
